Monday	Write from the perspective of a story character.	Watch the short film, The Wishgranter, and discuss it with an adult. Did you like it? What did you think of the characters? Did you like the ending? Talk about the man who wished for money. What do you think about him? Did he deserve to get all of that money? Why do you think he wished for it? Did he deserve it? Do you think he's a kind person? Choose whether you would like to write a diary or a letter to a friend from the perspective of the Money Wisher. If you write a diary, imagine you just got home and you write down all that happened to you that night- it's quite a story! If you write a letter, do the same but set it out as an informal letter to a friend. Remember how to set out a letter from last week! Writing checklist: Are you writing in the first person? Have you used a range of punctuation? (full stops, exclamation marks, question marks, commas)	Does your letter read as though it was written by the man who wished for money? Did you use your imagination to think about why he wanted all of that money? Tuesday	Use speech marks correctly.	<ul> <li>Have you included key events from the story?</li> <li>Re-watch the film if you can't remember it well. Alternatively, just watch the last minute again.</li> <li>Today you will write the conversation that you imagine the man and woman had at the end of the film, when they meet beside the well. You will be using speech marks in your writing, so please watch this video first to refresh your memory on how to use them correctly. Speech marks - KS2</li> <li>English - BBC Bitesize Set your conversation out like this, starting a new line each time a different character speaks.</li> <li>"Wow!" said the man. "What on earth happened there?"</li> <li>The woman said, "I have no idea, but I'm really happy to meet you! My name is"</li> <li>"My name is" said the man. "I'm glad to meet you too."</li> <li>Be as imaginative as you like- it's up to you what they talk about, but please try to make it fit with the story if you can. Maybe you could draw some pictures to go alongside your writing.</li> </ul>	Check your writing to make sure that you have used speech marks correctly. 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Wednesday	Justify my choices in clear sentences.	Look back at the part in the film where the Wishgranter presses the buttons on his wish machine. Notice how he selects what type of wish he will grant people. Imagine you are the Wishgranter. Which buttons would you have? You'll need to think about the things people need or want most in the world, e.g. money, love, happiness, a good job, a sporting talent etc. Create a 'control desk' for your wish machine, adding symbols to buttons to show what type of wish each one would grant. Underneath your wish control desk, write a paragraph to explain why you have chosen each thing. Why are these things important to people? Which one would you want to choose if you could? Explain why.
